for generators of alternating electric and magnetic fields, DC motors, LED emitters with variable intensity, precise dual-output thermostats



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EHM-C module is a control circuit for generators of alternating electric and magnetic fields. Two DC motors can be also connected as an inductive load. Additionally, the scheme is utilized for controlling LED emitters with variable brightness, as well as in the highvoltage/ultrashort-pulses mode. With



external temperature sensors LM35/AD592, the module has a functionality of dual-output (heater/cooler) digital thermostat with PID controller. The EHM-C module consists of four parts: the high voltage generator (5-1200V), the controller of inductive load (5-40V, 2A, reversible); the controller of a high current load (5-30V, up to 100A (500A) impulse current) and a microcontroller system for modulating all outputs with up to 5MHz of the carrier frequency and the secondary low-frequency 0.1Hz - 1kHz modulation. The module is powered from USB when the consumed average current is less than 0.5A (0.9A), a higher load current requires an external power supply. The module has an internal 5V to 40V (3A) voltage converter. Heat dissipation capacity is about 2W, an external heat sink is required to dissipate more heat. Management - enabling and disabling outputs, setting voltages and frequencies, programming timers and PID controller to operate in autonomous mode – is possible via USB by using a client program or by ASCII commands. The advantage of this module is the capability to control combined opto- magneto- electric devices, to use standard USB batteries for mobile applications, to operate autonomously without external control. Due to a small size, the EHM-C module can be easily integrated into other devices and systems.

Attention!



High voltage! Risk of electric shock!

Despite the current in a high-voltage part is very small, there is a risk of electric shock. Operation of the EHM-C module must be carried out in accordance with safety instructions and local safety regulations. The module should be installed only by persons certified for such operations. After installing electric field emitters, connectors and solder pads <u>must be covered with insulating lacquer</u>.

Risk of damaging connected devices!

Connected devices can be damaged as a result of incorrect settings. For example, when applying a high voltage to the LEDs with wrong PWM settings, the LEDs can be damaged. It needs to check carefully the settings for frequency, pulse duration and input/output voltage. It is recommended to use the version with fixed parameters for critical applications.

Risk of damaging the USB interface!

USB is one of possible power sources for the module. Power consumption of the module itself does not exceed the limit of USB current, but connected devices may draw current that exceeds this limit. Before use, it is necessary to supply connected devices with corresponding voltage and current through an external power supply. Although damages of USB have not yet been reported, it is recommended to use the USB hub and do not connect the module directly to PC. When a consumed current is close to the limit of USB, transient current spikes can appear. During this time the USB port will be switched off, and the control via USB will be not possible. In this case it is recommended to use an external power supply.



Risk of overheating!

The module is designed to operate within the conditions, listed in the section "Absolute Maximum Rating". However, when switching a high current, MOSFETs are heated and consequently, they heat the entire module. It is recommends to install the EHM-C module on surfaces that allow removing the heat – also with thermal grease (heat sink

paste) - for this purpose the bottom side contains no elements and is connected to ground. For larger heat dissipation it is recommended to use the version of the module with external heatsinks as well as to use the forced airflow.

Manufacturer is not liable for any consequences of incorrect usage of the EHM-C module, including the injuries of personal due to high voltage, damages of connected devices, damages of the USB or any surrounding objects, in particular due to overheating of the module by switching a high current (see more in section "Notes on Application").

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1. FUNCTIONAL DIAGRAM



(*) When the high-current power supply is connected to the connector " V_{EX} (high-current)", the switch must be opened or set in the position "5V" - <u>otherwise the integrated voltage converter will be damaged</u> (see more in section "Connecting the Module)!

The bottom side of the PCB contains only ground signals and has no components, thus it is safe to attach the EHM-C module to any metallic objects and surfaces (also with thermal grease - heat sink paste).

Connection between the supply voltage V_{EX} and the output 18/40V (in the switch) should be avoided - other case the module can be destroyed.



The L input should never be connected to 18/40V output when the supply voltage V_{EX} (high current) is connected to the back connector of the module - this can destroy the voltage converter.



6. SPI/I2C CONNECTOR

Contacts of the SPI/I2C connector are shown in figure below.



7. Sound and Light Indication

The module has green and red LEDs as light indicators (see the table on the previous page) and a piezo buzzer for sound indication. When enabled, two short beeps signal the data is loaded from the EEPROM. If the EEPROM download fails, the module signals one long beep and loads default values. Short beep signals an operation of the periodic timer.

8. INTEGRATED VOLTAGE CONVERTER

The voltage converter circuit is based on TPS55340, which includes a 5A 40V MOSFET switch. The converter is able to supply about 3A current from 5V supply without significantly heating the module. 18V/40V jumper allows selecting 18V or 40V. The actual output voltage of the converter differs from 18V or 40V. It depends on the version of module and the load current, see electrical characteristics. For compatibility with the BD6232HFP, the maximum voltage is limited to 36 (38 volts).

9. THE E OUTPUT: HIGH VOLTAGE CONVERTER

The E output is designed primarily for electric field emitters, which need a high voltage in the range of 500V - 1200V. It uses a two-stage boost converter, the first stage is based on the chip TPS55340 5-30V to 36-40V, the

second stage produces the voltage up to 1200V. Current of the second stage is very small, however, <u>this voltage</u> is dangerous for humans – all open contacts should be covered with insulating lacquer. Modulation of the DC voltage is performed by switching on/off the second stage converter. The resistor R_E allows an electric charge to flow to the ground, and thus to modulate the electric field.



Metal objects of arbitrary geometry can be used as an emitter. When a capacitor-like emitter is used, for example, a cylindrical capacitor, the second capacitor plate must be connected to the ground.

When connecting the emitter, the following conditions should be taken into account:

- 1. To achieve a maximal output voltage on the L output, the 18/40V jumper should be open.
- 2. The emitter introduces an additional capacity to C_E. Therefore, significant changes in the electric field intensity can be observed at some frequencies.
- 3. It is recommended to measure the intensity of generated electric field and, if necessary, to adapt: 1) the duty cycle of low-frequency modulation and 2) the value of resistance R_E 20-30Mom to achieve the maximal intensity of alternating electric field. Large values of R_E increase the amplitude of oscillations, however, also increase the discharge time. The duty cycle of low-frequency modulation allows changing the charge/discharge time of the capacitor.
- 4. The value of R_E (default value 25MOm) should be adapted for capacitor-like emitters of electric field.

Below two spectrograms at frequencies ~166Hz and ~500Hz with the value R_E 20MOm and the duty cycle 50% are shown (*).





(*) Intensity of an alternating electric field (with a planar emitter connected to the output E) at the low frequency modulation ~166Hz and ~500Hz, measured near the surface of the emitter by SPECTRAN NF5010, sampling time 5000ms, attenuator-40db, span 15Hz, filter bandwidth 1Hz.

10. The H output: Reverse Switching of Inductive Load

The H output is a full H bridge based on BD6232HFP in HRP7 package. The scheme allows switching a maximal current up to 2A.



Outputs HL and HH can be connected to inductive devices, such as inductors, DC motors, servomotors, etc. If switching a high current is required, use the L output. The input of this circuit is connected to the voltage converter. Thus, V-input receives 18V/36-40V or external input voltage 6-30V from V_{EX}. The circuit operates with the minimum input voltage 6V. For reversion, the modes "Reverse (PWM control mode A)" and "Forward (PWM control mode B)" are implemented, see the manual for BD6232HFP. The PWM signal is also inverted, see diagrams below.



Due to different forward and reverse operating modes, there is an asymmetric switching current in these modes.

11. THE L OUTPUT: COMMUTATING HIGH IMPULSE CURRENT

The L output is a balanced dual n-channel MOSFET switch (the version 1.3 is based on MOSFET IRLZ34NS or BUK9606), intended for switching loads with a high pulse current. Each of the transistors in D2PAK packages can switch the current up to (see section "Notes on Switching High Impulse Current"):

- **BUK9606** 153A and the impulse current up to 612A at pulse duration <10µs, the static drain-tosource on-resistance – 4.7 mOm, the input capacitance - 8770-11693 pF
- IRLZ34NS 30A and the impulse current up to 110A, the static drain-to-source on-resistance 35-60 mOm, the input capacitance 880 pF



The capacitor $4700-10000\mu$ F, 50V is external to the circuit (i.e., to be installed by user). The minimal pulse duration is 90-140ns, the maximal frequency of the signal is 5 MHz, see figures below.



The minimal PWM frequency at the pulse duration ~100ns is about 152Hz.



Switching inductive loads may cause a damped oscillation with the amplitude of about 0.1-0.3V.



Any devices that can be switched on the lower MOSFET side - motors, lamps, LED emitters, solenoids, resistance heaters etc. – can be used as the L load. The resistor R is 10 Ohm, 2W. The following conditions must be taken into account:

- 1. Input supply voltage V_{EX} (high current) should be connected to the back connector, close to MOSFETs.
- 2. When switching a high impulse current, the MOSFET transistors produce heat. For heat dissipation the PCB as well as the heatsink are used. To improve the heat dissipation, the PCB must be fixed on a solid (metal) surface, which conducts heat. It needs to make sure that the air can circulate around the board. If a dissipation of a large thermal power is required, it needs to install MOSFETs on an external heatsink (or to use the version of the module with an external heatsink). When the temperature of the board (near the microcontroller and TPS55340) exceeds 50°C, the module will enter into a standby mode, i.e. connected devices will be disabled.
- 3. Parasitic current of reverse polarity, arising when switching an inductive load, should be avoided. When switching a high current, <u>connect a high-speed high-power Schottky diode in parallel to the existing Schottky diode.</u>
- 4. An external capacitor 4700-10000µF, 50B (with low ESR) should be connected to the board, as indicated in the section "Application examples". <u>Without using such an external capacitor, a high switching current can damage capacitors on the PCB.</u>

12. NOTES ON SWITCHING HIGH IMPULSE CURRENT

The L output is able to switch a high impulse current. For example, at an average current 1A, with a pulse duration 1 ms and a duty cycle of 1%, the pulse current is about 100A. Although the output MOSFETs in the version with BUK9606 allow switching current much higher than 100A, the heat dissipation capacity of the EHM-C module is limited. Therefore, three factors limit the maximum current: the heat from MOSFET, losses in the PCB (and as a consequence its heating), and a power supply, which is not always able to provide the desired pulse current. When switching a high current, it is necessary to take into account the following conditions:

- 1. Use short connecting wires.
- 2. Solder the wires as close as possible to the terminals of transistors.
- 3. Use a small duty cycle (1% -2%) and short activation pulses (100ns-500ns).
- 4. Use two separate power supplies (for digital and analog parts). In parallel to the external power supply it is necessary to install a large external capacitor (4700 -10000μF, 50-70V). This capacitor must be installed as close as possible to the module.
- 5. Monitor the temperature of output MOSFET. For safety reasons, it should not exceed 80°C.

13. Reducing Electronic Noise

The maximal electronic noise measured on the power line of the microcontroller is about 150mV (when the voltage converter 5-40V is ON) and about 250mV (when the voltage converter 40-1200V is ON). The amplitude of noise caused by switching external devices, such as DC motors, may be of several volts. This electronic noise propagates via power supply lines into other systems and can affect a variety of digital and analog circuits. It is necessary to reduce this noise on power supply lines by installing external LC filters. Since all PWM signals are generated by hardware, EHM-C module is completely immune to own electronic noise, and to a certain extent – it is also immune to a noise generated by connected devices. Nevertheless, it is recommended to satisfy the following conditions.

- 1. Module should be programmed only when a load is off.
- 2. Power supply must provide the necessary current and ensure its stability. Unstable level of voltage can cause restarting the microcontroller.
- 3. Use two independent power supplies when commutating a high current: one for the digital part and another one for the L output. To do this, <u>open switch (remove all connections in the switch)</u> and connect the high-current power to the connector " V_{EX} (high-current)" and power a digital part either via USB or via the " V_{EX} ".

In some cases (switching a high current without separate power supply for a digital part), loss of data in EEPROM ATMEL AVR microcontroller has been reported. These conditions are not well reproducible and appear to be related to disruptions in the supply voltage. For critical applications, we recommend to use the firmware, where the settings are hard-coded in the program (contact the manufacturer).

14. POWERING FROM USB

USB 2.0 ensures 500 mA/5V, USB 3.0 - 900mA/5V. Overstepping this current, even shortly, will shut down the USB port. When powering the EHM-C module from the USB interface, it needs to consider the following issues:

1. Short-term exceeding the current limit. When turning ON/OFF the internal voltage converter and connected devices, transient current peaks can appear. The USB port can respond by a short

disconnection, during this time the control over the module via USB is not possible. After turning ON/OFF, it needs to wait about 3-5x seconds before issuing the next commands.

- 2. Long-term exceeding the current limit. When the current limit is exceeded for long time, the USB port remains disabled. In this case, the control of the EHM-C module via USB is not possible. The module must be disabled via soft button and the settings must be changed after recovering the USB port. Alternatively, an external power supply can be connected, while the EHM-C module is still plugged into the USB port.
- 3. External power supply with USB operation. With external power supply, USB port can be still connected to the EHM-C module to provide the control and to supply the digital part. For this, the external voltage on V_{EX} must be at least 0.3- 0.5V higher than 5V.

15. SWITCHING ON/OFF

Enabling and disabling the EHM-C module may occur via USB commands, soft button and by switching an external power supply. To (dis-)activate the module, instead of pressing a soft button, the "0"-signal on the button's pad can be provided. Duration of the "0"-signal must be about 500 ms and is calculated by $L=[(int)(500/(D_H + D_L)])*(D_H + D_L)$ in ms., where D_H is a duration of the "high" PWM pulse, DL is a duration of the "low" PWM pulse. For $(500/(D_H + D_L))<1$, the value of 1 is used. When the signal "0" is more than 2L, it will periodically reactivate/deactivate the module. When enabled by the supply voltage, as well as after a reboot, the EHM-C module is about 100 ms in the standby mode (to avoid transient voltage).

16. USING PRECISE TEMPERATURE SENSORS LM35 AND AD592

The EHM-C module is designed to operate with external temperature sensors such as LM35 or AD592. LM35 has a voltage output and can be directly connected to the board. The voltage level in mV from the sensor corresponds to the measured temperature. Default voltage-temperature conversion rate is adapted for LM35. AD592 is a temperature transducer with the current output. This output signal should be transformed into the voltage form, suitable for the ADC input. The resolution of the 10-bit ADC is improved by oversampling and decimation approach (see "Atmel Application note AVR121: Enhancing ADC resolution by oversampling") towards 16-bit resolution that allows a relative resolution of temperature measurement about 0.01°C or below. The absolute accuracy of temperature measurement corresponds to the accuracy of sensors and is about 0.3°C-0.5°C. With a precise digital thermometer, the absolute accuracy of LM35/AD592 sensors can be improved by using additive calibration coefficient (see the "y" command for temperature calibration). Thus the absolute accuracy of 0.01C can also be archived. Follow recommendations from LM35 and AD592 datasheets regarding connections and improvement of noise performance.



LM35 and AD592 require the $+V_s$ voltage between 4V and 30V. This voltage can be obtained from the input. However, this voltage source can contain a high-amplitude noise from MOSFETs. Thus, it is more V_{EX} preferably to use the voltage from the internal 5V LDO (pin 1 of LM2931 LDO, see the image above). The ground signal can be obtained from any GND point on the PCB. The V_{out} of the LM35 sensor (and the voltage-converted signal from AD592) should be soldered to the P2 SMD pad, which is located close to I2C/SPI connector. The temperature measurement with external sensors allows a variety of applications such as precise thermostats, monitoring a temperature of MOSFET's heatsinks or any other objects during operation of the EHM-C module, remote data loggers.

<u>NOTE</u>: The default version of the firmware uses 17-bit interpolation approach. Microcontroller takes one sample each 2 seconds when the options "PID On/Off" or "t output on UART" are ON, other case – one sample of temperature data (from the on-PCB sensor) each 4 seconds. Contact the manufacturer to obtain a firmware with another functionality.

17. I/O PINS P1 AND P2

Pins P1 and P2 are general I/O ports, which can be configured as input or output pins. In addition, P2 is connected to 10-bit ADC with the 3.3V reference voltage and can be used to digitalize an analog signal. In the default firmware, P2 is configured as analog input for LM35/AD592 temperature sensors. P1 is configured as an output pin, which can be controlled through USB interface and the PID controller. When the PID controller is ON, P1 pin indicates achieving the setpoint $|t_{setpoint}-t_{actual}| < 0.05C$ by driving the LED (through 2000m resistor).

18. PID REGULATOR – THERMOSTAT AND OTHER CONTROL APPLICATIONS

The EHM-C module has the Proportional-Integral-Derivative (PID) discrete feedback controller:

$$y[n] = K_P^*e[n] + K_I^*i[n] + K_D^*d[n]$$

 $d[n] = (e[n] - e[n-1])$
 $i[n] = \Sigma e[n]$

where e[n] is the error, y[n] is the control output. The coefficients K_P (proportional gain constant), K_I (integral gain constant), K_D (derivative gain constant) are adjustable via USB interface. Since thermostat applications usually possess an essential thermal inertion, the integral term $K_I^*i[n]$ produces oscillations when arriving the setpoint. The following condition limits

if (abs(e[n]>t_{TR}) i[i]=0

the area (close to setpoint, $t_{TR}=1^{\circ}C$), where the integral part starts accumulating the values. The value of y[n] control output is limited by 1000. To implement dual-output thermostat, the output of the PID controller is connected to L and H outputs and changes their duty cycles, whereas the users can still adapt the L/H PWM frequency (and thus the maximal current). In the default version of firmware, only the L output for resistive heaters at y[n]>0 is used (since different coolers require different control mechanisms). User can adjust the PWM frequency of L output to set the maximal current through the resistance heater.

All values in the PID controller are updated each 2 seconds (when the options "PID On/Off" is ON). Due to a noise of temperature sensors, a small oscillation of the controlled temperature can occur. The temperature curve (LM35 sensor, 17 bit interpolation, 6.7 Om 5W heater, 5kHz PWM, $K_{I,P,D}$ parameters from the table above) for setpoints 28°C, 30°C, 34°C and 29°C is shown in the following image.



The PID controller allows implementing different control mechanisms, such as controlling brightness of LED emitters depending of light conditions, velocity of DC motors and others. Note that the firmware uses interpolation of ADC input values, thus only slowly changing input signals, such as from temperature sensors, can be used in the default version of the firmware.

Simplified procedure to adjust the PID controller (generally refer to manuals on tuning PID controllers):

- Turn off the PID controller. Set the duty of L output to 1000. Vary the frequency of L output (in the range 1001-...) to adjust the maximal current through the heater. For instance, when the 40V converter is OFF, the value of 1001 (the PWM frequency 9.9kHz) with R (from L part) 10Om and R_{HEATER} 6.7Om produces about 0.37A (powered from 5V USB).
- 2. Turn on the PID controller (the options "PID On/Off" is ON). Turn on the "t output on UART" option. By using a Serial Port Terminal (Serial Port parameters 9600, 8,1,0) monitor the value of actual temperature.
- 3. Set K_I and K_P to zero (leave K_D unchanged). Set K_P so that the actual temperature goes close to the setpoint, however does not produce oscillations when arriving the setpoint. Usually setting of K_P occurs stepwisely in several iterations.
- 4. Set the K_I coefficient (usually it is much smaller than K_P) so that the integral part incrementally adjusts the actual temperature to the setpoint.

<u>NOTE</u>: The PID controller should never be used without connected external temperature sensor. When the sensor is not connected, the y[n] control output will achieve and always keep its maximal value of 1000.

19. CONTROL COMMANDS

All control commands are ASCII characters transmitted via the serial (USB-UART bridge) interface. Before any other commands, the instruction "1h2h" should be issued. This enables the command-receiving mode. For example, the command:

1h2h000a

turns off the EHM-C module. All received parameters are immediately stored in the EEPROM. The list of available commands is shown in the following table:

20. CONTROL VIA CLIENT PROGRAM

Parameters of the module can be set with a program that visualizes the settings and converts them into ASCII characters (contact the manufacturer to obtain the program).

1. Connect the EHM-C module to USB port with USB-miniUSB cable.



- 2. Install driver of virtual com port "MCP2200 Windows Driver" from Microchip (www.microchip.com/mcp2200 or from www.cybertronica.de.com).
- 3. After installing the driver, a USB Serial Port (COM Port) will be assigned to the module.
- 4. This port should be selected in the combo-box of the program.

- 5. The program will connect to the module and read parameters from EEPROM.
- 6. The program is separated into seven blocks, which corresponds to functional capabilities of the EHM-C module: (1) voltage converter 40V, (2) E-output, (3) H-output, (4) L-output, (5) Low-frequency modulation, (6) Periodical timer, (7) PID controller
- 7. Additional functionality:
 - a. **run-on-start** if this is activated, after powering the module will start operation with parameters from EEPROM
 - b. sound switching ON and OFF will by indicated by sound
 - c. sound-signal switching ON and OFF by periodic timer will by indicated by sound
- 8. Buttons:
 - a. Start start operation
 - b. **Stop** stop operation
 - c. **Reset** load default parameters
 - d. Restart reboot of the microcontroller
 - e. Save send the parameters into microcontroller and store them in EEPROM

Additionally, the program indicates a unique hardware ID number of the module, a firmware version, the temperature on the PCB near the microcontroller and the converter TPS55340, and the temperature from external sensor. For monitoring purposes, all commands sent to the module and the responses received from the module are logged with timestamps: *day:hour:minute:second*, see the log window.

21. GENERATION OF SIGNALS

For signal generation, the system based frequency/duty-cycle settings is used. As shown in the figure below (left), the signal is determined by the duration of the phase "1" (the duration "HIGH") and the duration of the phase "0" (the duration "LOW").



Period of the signal is the sum of durations "0" and "1", the frequency is the reciprocal of the period, i.e. frequency=1/period. Duty cycle is defined as [100*(duration "1"/duration "0")]. In the case of 100% duty cycle - the signal is "1", if 0% duty cycle - the signal is "0". If the low-frequency modulation is enabled, the high-frequency signal is modulated by a low-frequency signal, as shown in the figure above (right). The low frequency modulation is determined only by the duration of the low frequency pulses (duration "HIGH", duration "LOW").



The duty cycle and frequency are defined in relative units, associated in hardware with generation of waveforms. The minimal possible change in the duration of pulses is defined by these units. There are corresponding fields for conversion into the units of time and frequency.

Periodical timer allows periodic switching ON and OFF of the module. Time at which the module will be ON is shown as ON, OFF - as OFF. The minimal time is 4 seconds. Values can be set in minutes and seconds. Switching ON and OFF can be accompanied by a beep. The cycle starts with the phase ON. Pressing the "STOP" turns OFF the module, but does not switch off the periodical timer; the module will be switched on again during the next cycle. Turn OFF the field "Timer On/Off" to disable the periodic timer.

The part with the PID controller has four fields with the setpoint (in $^{\circ}$ C) and the coefficients K_P, K_I, K_D. The option "t output on UART" provides the value of measured temperature via UART-USB. It can be viewed with a terminal application, Com Port parameters: 9600,8,1,0. Use this option for remote logging of temperature data. The option "P1 pin on/off" allows a manual control over the P1 output (it is overridden by the PID controller).
